Further on the old Kent Street manse. The "Young" was George Renny Young, a prominent Reform politician. The "Stairs" was William James Stairs, an original trustee and one of the principal pillars of Fort Massey. The church never owned the house, which Mr Stairs purchased in 1879 for use as the manse. It is unclear when the house ceased to be the manse. According to the official architectural description, "the building ... is a two-story wood frame structure built along the Second Empire style which was erected on a square stone foundation. These houses sometimes have a rectangular or square projecting tower, similar to the one on this structure, which is centred on the front facade. Both the building as well as the tower have a mansard roof. On the north [front] side, projecting from the roof, is a cantilevered window. Constructed on each side of the tower are two two-story projections. The bottom half of the projection is designed as a three-bay window with arched-shaped windows. The top half is styled in a rectangular shape, with gabled roofs. A small circular-shaped window was added as decoration to the roof of the tower. Cornices were added under the top portion of the three projections. The entryway has a large double door with a transom window."
