HERITAGE MOMENT By Barry Cahill

It is instructive to compare the origin of Fort Massey with that of the "West End Extension," dedicated on 11 October 1888. That church planting was the first such Presbyterian initiative since Fort Massey.

Like Fort Massey it began as a Sunday school. Unlike Fort Massey, it was a formal undertaking of the city ministers and elders conference. The dedication service was presided over by Fort Massey elder, John S. Smith, superintendent of the Sunday school which had been organized in the area nine months earlier. The service raised \$408 towards paying off the debt incurred by purchasing and rehabilitating the old Coburg Road Methodist church. "A little girl, belonging to the Sunday school, was warmly applauded as she came forward with her \$1."

Some of us will remember this former church building, which stood for years at the southeast corner of Coburg Road and LeMarchant Street. Such was the remote beginning of today's St Andrew's United Church.
